





FROM THE RECTORY

Dear Friends,

This last week contained a first for me – I attended a meeting to do with gardening (albeit online). I had a strong feeling of 'impostor syndrome', not being one of the many people locally who are expert gardeners. But I was there because we were discussing possible plans for social events in the summer, and the Flower Show working group and the church could see it would be far more sensible if there was a bit of working together.

Of course, nothing can be planned now that is certain to happen, but I think we have all got used to that. However, we all agreed that it will be fantastic just for people to get together. In Holmbury, while the Flower Show working group are working towards a summer Flower Show, the church is also planning to organise a Vintage Fête (which MUST include 'splat the rat') to raise money for charity, and hope many people will volunteer ideas and be involved. Everyone was saying that there is simply an appetite to be together, though we all know that any easing of restrictions must be cautious, as there is no desire whatsoever for another false dawn.

Community get-togethers used to be regular, normal occurrences. Many, many times in rural Norfolk, I asked an elderly person how they had first met their partner, and got the answer 'at the weekly village dance'. Talking to people who have been in these 2 villages a long time, it's been good to hear about annual events in the past like the New Year's dance, the Wives' group Christmas party for the over 65s, and the WI May market. There was a time when Barn Dances in the Village Hall were excellent occasions for people to enjoy themselves and to raise money for charity (such as the Vietnamese Boat People) and for improvements to the Hall itself. And where there is a village school, that in itself generates a lot of people just meeting each other at the school gate. That is all quite apart from the number of groups that used to exist that no longer do.

It's **still** a notable feature of village life at its best in this country that people do have events that bring people together. The Wotton Fête is

legendary and seems to involve as wide a group of local people as possible, likewise the Wotton Flower Show Cream Teas in May and the Wotton Flower Show itself. The annual bonfire in Holmbury with the associated children's fancy dress parade, the Flower Shows and the annual village quiz are still firmly on the social calendar. And it was exactly this time last year that we had a pancake party in the village hall and had about 70 people passing through.

The value of these things may go deeper than we all realise. The former Chief Rabbi, Jonathan Sacks, writes about how our lifestyles since the 1960s have steadily become less rooted in the local community, simply because increased wealth and technology have created so many more opportunities to find and experience things that are 'tailor made' for us, things that people before 1960 could never even have dreamed of. That is a wonderful feature of living in this present age. And yet, we do still need local community so much. People round about who know who we are and in some kind of way will look out for us, even if we're not close friends.

I love the fact that Jesus' first miracle was at a village wedding (a major event for the <u>whole</u> community in that era and culture). And that the first time he met with some serious criticism was when he and his disciples were having a meal together with some of the local people who were regarded as 'not the best types' — the question in some people's minds was "How could he even think of bringing these 2 groups together?". Even on the cross, among his last words were when he looked at his grief-stricken mother and his close friend John, said they were to treat each other as family from then on, and we're told that John looked after Mary in his home from that time onwards. Jesus regularly brought people together. So, let's hope these village traditions last for a long time to come. And as a church, we certainly want to do what we can to facilitate bringing people together.

GEOFF DUNN

Geoff Dunn died on 6th December after a long struggle with Alzheimer's. He was 87.

Geoff and Sue moved to Dale Cottage in 1969. In 1986, following Geoff's retirement as a 747 Captain for British Airways, they moved to Abinger Hammer.



Geoff was one of the major contributors in transforming Abinger Cricket Club and founding Abinger Sports Club. He also made a considerable contribution to Surbiton Hockey Club. His work over several years for The Surrey Playing Fields Association was recognised in 2003 when HRH Prince Philip presented him with The President's Certificate.

LOCAL PEOPLE – JAMES FRIEND

SF - Where were you born?

"Although our family roots are really in Woodford Green in Essex, only my Aunt remains there, the rest of us have moved away. I was born in Swindon, in the hospital that you used to be able to see from the M4 but which was replaced a few years ago by the brand new Great Western Hospital. My father was a teacher, originally of Geography, but latterly Head of the Lower School at the Comprehensive that I went to in Totnes, South Devon. My mother was a housewife. I've one younger brother who coincidentally moved to Reigate, so we are not far apart now. We see much more of each other now since our father passed away six months ago. Our mother now lives in Storrington, West Sussex having moved up from Devon a few years after Father's retirement.

"My primary schooling was in Dartington and wasn't exactly a typical experience – the school tried to compete with the neighbouring Steiner School which meant a slightly ad hoc new age 1970's / 1980's curriculum. For folks unfamiliar with Totnes and Dartington it is very much the new age capital of the country. Our first home there is now a Crystal Healing Centre. Maths was taught by someone who really influenced me - Dr Deans from Exeter University, whilst he piloted and tested what is now referred to as the Singapore method. This means I tend to come to problem solving in some strange ways. It must have had some impact on me as I did the usual mix of Maths, Physics, Chemistry and a bit of Geology for A Levels. Our A level Maths teacher, who had taught us through GCSEs too, left early in the start of A Level. We taught ourselves after that as none of the other Maths teachers could follow what we were doing! Pretty much all I ever use from my secondary education is the small amount of French | learnt - which I then augmented working in Private Banking in Geneva for a while in the late 1990s. We go to France fairly regularly (when we can) with the language supported by Catherine's French degree – both our children are far better at languages than I will ever be. At school, I ran the school bank – essentially a marketing exercise by Midland Bank at that time, and that was a field I returned to later.

"After school I went straight to Royal Holloway (then Royal Holloway and Bedford New College) University of London in Englefield Green, Egham. At that time it had around 1,400 students — around 800 fewer than we had at my Secondary School. It was a very easy transition and easy to get to know each other. I rarely went back to Devon after that, working for Barclays Bank throughout my three years of study as I needed the money. In general that meant living back with

family friends in Woodford which I really enjoyed. I took a short time out to study at a

Liberal Arts college in Pennsylvania but frankly didn't learn much at all — the topics were really at no more than our GCSE levels and so, after some time in conversation with their chaplain, I returned to Royal Holloway rather more quickly than I might otherwise have done. It's taught me to change things in my life when they aren't adding value to me or to others and to focus on what matters most to me. After University I joined Lloyds Bank first of in Brighton, living with Cath's parents in nearby Southwick, whilst she was on her year in France for her degree, before I moved back to working in the City of London, and initially living back in Woodford once more.

SF - How did you come to live in Wotton/Westcott?

"I was living with my closest friends back in Englefield Green whilst working for Lloyds Bank in Commercial London's Old Bond Street. On graduation, Cath started working for Allders in their international duty free business based at both Gatwick and Heathrow. We started house hunting where the lines fanning out from our jobs intersected. Fetcham wasn't for us, Leatherhead neither, and then we found a little home in the centre of Westcott and have been in the village ever since. After four years and with thinking about family, we moved to the last house in the village before it becomes Wotton — a much easier walk to St John's on a Sunday morning. Four years ago we moved almost exactly half way back

to where we had been before. It's a good way to spend money on Stamp Duty. It took us a couple of years in Westcott to realise that St Mary's Holmbury had previously been a beacon in our lives. On the Christmas journeys home from Englefield

Green to Southwick, my sense of adventure had

taken us on a route off the A25 and via Felday Road through the hills to Ockley and the A24. Cath simply adores me for my night time navigation skills — rather than sticking to more recognisable routes such as the handily placed M25!"

SF - How did you meet Cath?

"Cath and I met at Royal Holloway. I completed my Duke of Edinburgh Gold Award during my A Levels – although I had to do mine with the nearby Grammar School as the comprehensive struggled to resource it. When I arrived at Royal Holloway I became at first the Treasurer and then Chairman of the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Society – the only one at that time in the University of London. Whilst running that we did a night orienteering exercise with Surrey County Council on Box Hill during which the participating Cath managed to get utterly lost in the dark and rain. I think I probably wasn't in the best of moods when we found her. It was though a theme to continue in our lives, we were engaged shortly thereafter."

SF -What interests you?

"Folks will know I'm a local councillor. I got into it really through my belief in the importance of education and having been Chair of School Governors at Westcott and then Surrey Hills. A church school education brings to folks something very special in the fabric of life. I am also a trustee of a local charity supporting people who work in homelessness and also of Westcott Sports Club where perhaps my off- the-field contributions are stronger than my on-field ones.

I've played cricket since I was a boy, first for Totnes, then at Royal Holloway, then for both Woodford Green and Woodford Wells, then for a travelling band called the Wandering Minstrels (who have an indirect connection to the Whyte Effect choir that come to Wotton from time to time) and then for Westcott when my banking life wasn't taking me overseas.

"In all that time I was never really much good at it, but playing at Westcott gave me probably the greatest friendship of my life with the relationship with Len Edwards. I will never forget walking into St John's on my first time there and seeing Len sitting in the back row. (Cath and I were married at Holy Trinity Westcott in 1997 but it was a tad "big" for

me at the time and I had started to think about needing another type of church experience) His first words to me being "If you are coming to my church, boy, then you had better sit next to me". Cath was in Redhill hospital at the time in one of her many admissions before Mattie was born. I was so grateful that later that same day I found myself having the first proper meal that I'd had for a while as Len insisted I joined him and the rest of the St John's congregation for Harvest Lunch. That, to this day, remains the highlight of the church year for me (closely followed by Christingle and the Fete!)."

SF - Do you have any hobbies?

"My main hobby is Hospital Radio. Back when I was doing my own D of E award, I started broadcasting and served Totnes League of Friends Radio as their Treasurer, as well as presenting the weekly Hymn programme amongst other things (including developing a wide regard for the music of Gentleman Jim Reeves). When I was working in London and living in Englefield Green I joined Hospital Radio Wey, at first presenting the Maternity Request Show and then Saturday Sportscene. I'm still doing Sportscene either from the studio or from local football matches (when COVID allows) some 27 years later.

SF - Anything else?

"My other passion is really around the environment — something drummed into me from my New Age primary schooling. I love to up-cycle things in little projects, from beds to children's easels, pretty much anything can find a new use. COVID has given me the gift of some time to do these projects and also keeping my oxygen levels up by walking in the hills — taking me back again to D of E days and walking on Dartmoor especially. I'd love to get some time to do more walking around the country and reunite myself with Dartmoor one day. It's a place I used to know like the back of my hand."

SF – Thank you so much for this.

GARDENING NOTES

When our kids were really young we joined a club called the Humpty Dumpty club, an organisation that sent out a monthly "to do, make and read" package. The one thing that I can remember is the Humpty Dumpty calendar, a clock face with 12 months



and four seasons. To drag this diatribe out a little longer, Summer was June, July and August, Autumn was September, October and November, Winter was December, January and February and - here's the point, Spring was March, April and May. Why go to all this trouble to mention it? Well, beware of rushing out into the garden and whacking in your seeds on St David's day, it's only the very start of Spring and there may well be some cold weather yet to come. "In like a lion, out like a lamb" is an adage well worth taking notice of. So, especially in our area, I would be wary of putting in anything that is just a tad on the delicate side, so crack on with broad beans and early peas, onions and shallots, beetroot and maybe parsnips and carrots but definitely hang fire on French and Runner beans, tomatoes and the curbits (courgettes cucumbers etc.). Radishes and lettuces can go in under cover and should be up pretty quickly. The old boys (I guess I am now one of those!) would sprinkle a few radish seeds in their rows of parsnips. Parsnips are slow to germinate (frustratingly - you are never sure whether they are slow or dead), so the radishes not only show where the parsnips have been planted, but give an early crop too. The speed at which they grow and are ready for eating makes them a wonderful vegetable to get youngsters interested in growing with only one problem - kids tend not to like them, but they won't know that until they try them! Incidentally, parsnip seeds are really only worth planting fresh, so avoid planting last year's seeds, they will give very poor germination. As you are almost certain to have a couple of uneaten parsnips on your plot, why not try and grow your own seeds for next year? I might just be a bit biased, but they look quite interesting and

will give you a fine crop of seeds (even if the plant will probably get to be taller than you!) Last year I wasn't quite careful enough in cropping the seeds and as a result, got self-sown parsnips all over the lotty, Not untypically the self-seeded ones did better than the ones I planted in my nice straight rows.

If, like me, you got caught out with the snow and now need to rebuild your fruit cage, it's worth reminding you that gooseberries are early to flower and set fruit, so prioritise protecting them. I'm almost resigned to sacrificing my redcurrants to the blackbirds, but only on the proviso that they leave the gooseberries alone. I have found that careful netting of these work so much better than leaving them uncovered with signs directing birds to the redcurrants. I can't blame them though, I suspect that were the roles reversed, I'd ignore the signs too - and I can read!

Towards the end of the month, the clocks go forward, so you will have an extra hour of daylight available in the evening. Less of a need to rush home after work to get things done - were it not for the fact that most of us are already home! Looking on the bright side though, things are bursting back into life and elsewhere in this edition you will find details of the potato growing competition, open to all kids in the village (with help from parents and possibly grandparents too!) We are hoping that there will be some kind of flower show this summer, but I'm sure it is not beyond the whit of man to arrange a weighing in even if we are forbidden from meeting up.

This year I took a chance on leaving my dahlias in and covering them with a cloche for protection. Then came the snow, then the frosts, so I am now thinking in terms of buying some new ones in after all. I have a particular favourite called Evelyn, of which I have (had?) three good plants, so I am hoping a cloche has been good enough. Lesson learned, next year, dig up at least one to store in a shed........ It is said that you learn by your mistakes, but as I have remarked before, it's well worth writing down what has happened to you. Memory is a bit selective!

I do hope that you are coping (have coped?) with the latest lockdown. Hopefully by the time you read this, we'll all be allowed a little more lassitude and might be able to visit displays of daffodils, tulips and the

like. Are we able to claim Wisley is local? Hope so! Whatever else, I hope your garden and our lovely countryside provide you with consolation. Good luck with the new season.

SHERE SURGERY

Spring has finally arrived, and with it hopefully promise of some healthier months ahead.

The Covid Vaccination Programme has been going really well, and 180 of you are now on the SALV email



distribution list, receiving my updates when things change. At the time of

writing, we have had excellent uptake from the Over 80's, the Over 70's, the Clinically Extremely Vulnerable, the Housebound & those with Learning Disabilities. We are continuing to work on our Homeless population and by the time you read this I hope we will be actively booking in anyone Over 60. I've spoken with a lot of pride about our hardworking team over the past year, but Reception and Admin deserve much recognition for the extra hours they have put in on the phones. Thank you for the positive feedback you gave from our virtual Twitter tour of the Surrey Hills on our Housebound Vaccination Day. We covered 140km of narrow roads in the Surrey Hills that day, against the deadline of vaccine expiry at 6pm. It was quite exciting, tiring, but lovely to see faces of those we haven't seen for so many months. We had a bit of fun stopping to take photos on the way and were pleased that this brought a bit of community cheer at a rather bleak time. We were followed online by 28,000 people at one point, from South West England to Scotland, including NHS England, which is staggering considering it was just supposed to be a bit of fun for our patients!

Second Covid Vaccinations: Keep your eye on the news as this has evolved over time, but once we are authorised to start giving second vaccinations, you will be contacted by the site that gave you your first. We are not expecting any involvement in this, and we won't be able to switch you to a different site. This is potentially subject to change, so keep an eye on Twitter, SALV updates, or posters at the Surgery. However, do not worry that you need to organise second vaccination, you will be contacted. Currently this is expected to be 12 weeks after the first.

Royal Surrey coped with the peak of the Second Wave really well, and we are so grateful to them, and to the Ambulance service, for helping to support our patients. Our thoughts are very much with the family members of our patients who sadly passed away during this time, but we are so grateful that the majority of our patients have recovered well.

SALV (Shere and Local Villages) Charity has been so supportive to us over the years, and over recent months I have been really grateful for the help with communication to the community. In the background, SALV have offered to buy us new seating for the surgery, which hopefully will be

arriving soon. Our current seating is not coping with the degree of cleaning required now and is starting to fatigue, which could be a problem for infection control. We are gradually redecorating the building inside to make it feel more warm and welcoming for our patients, and for our staff. Local photographer Michael Hutchinson is letting us use some of his images to create some high impact artwork for our reception area. We have a new surgery sign on its way to replace the faded green one, and a team of local volunteers are going to help clean the algae from the building. The pavement repairs and drainage issues in the road and disabled/ambulance bay will be addressed at the start of April thanks to a significant funding contribution from Shere Parish Council, to subsidise Surrey County Council shortfall.

SALV have booked their Spring Open Evening for Monday 26th April. The format for this will depend on social distancing at that point, but I would encourage anyone who hasn't attended before to come along. SALV have supported the surgery for many years, but it really feels that the past year has been different in so many ways. It would be nice to expand their reach to enable us to evolve our services going forward to meet the requirements of our community more effectively.


Remote Learning

Thames Water - over the past year there have been water supply problems for some of our residents; either low water pressure or sometimes no water at all. During these incidents, residents have found Thames Water lacking in communication with regard to the cause of the problem, length of time of repair and access to bottled water during long outages. The Parish Council has challenged Thames Water on their lack of communication and also gone to the Community Council for Water for support. Unfortunately, although they will address individual incidences, they will not engage with us over their general lack of communication with residents.

The Parish Council is most concerned for our vulnerable and elderly residents. If you are or know of anyone on the **list below**, please register with **Thames Water Priority Service** https://www.thameswater.co.uk/help/extra-care/priority-services or call 0800 009 3652

- Are eligible for a pension
- Have restricted mobility or a physical disability
- Have a chronic or serious illness.
- Need a consistent supply of water for a medical condition or equipment (such as kidney dialysis or skin conditions)
- Need foreign language or further communication support (such as dyslexia)
- Have problems making decisions that affect your daily life (such as dementia)
- Are registered blind or partially sighted are deaf or hard of hearing
- Are living with a mental health condition
- Are experiencing temporary life changes
- Are a family with young children under 5

To help, the Parish Council is ordering six larger bins with recycling and normal waste. Guildford Borough Council have kindly provided grant aid for 50% of the cost, as they are over £1,000 each. In the meantime, The Dabbling Duck and Shere Delights are purchasing two cup recycling units to be installed in Shere and the parish council is ordering an additional two for the villages.

FRIENDS OF THE HURTWOOD

The Friends of the Hurtwood are looking for a new Chair.

The incumbent is moving out of the area, so a new Chair is sought for the charity the Friends of the Hurtwood (FotH). The main task of the FotH is to preserve and manage public access and protect and improve the environment of the area known as the Hurtwood - over 2000 acres of heath and woodland in the Surrey Hills to the south of the Tillingbourne

Valley between Wotton and Albury, with panoramic views, hill forts and scheduled monuments.

The Hurtwood is privately owned common land with public access granted by the landowners. It's crossed by 60 miles of registered footpaths, bridleways and unofficial tracks plus 14 car



parks, popular with walkers, horse riders and mountain bikers. The Trust's £90,000 annual budget is funded by member subscriptions, local Councils, legacies, increasing public donations and the landowners themselves. It's governed by a Board of Directors who are local volunteers and land owners. They meet twice a year and organise an AGM. The Chair also leads the Management Committee, which meets every two months to oversee operations and advise the Board, including the management of the impact of the increasing and often conflicted public use. Day to day maintenance is done by an efficient and resourceful full time Ranger equipped with appropriate machinery who uses specialist sub-contractors as necessary. A twice yearly newsletter is produced for supporters.

They can return to school after 10 days and feel better, even if they have a cough of a loss of smell/taste as these symptoms can last for several weeks

THE VILLAGE LARDER AND THE HENRY SMITH FUND – SHERE

The civil parish of Shere is fortunate to have two local charities offering residents of the Parish financial help if they are in need.

The **Village Larder**, the newest of these, was only set up last April, in conjunction with the Henry Smith Fund -Shere. Its specific purpose is to offer financial help to residents of the parish who find themselves short of money to be able to afford to pay their weekly food bills, as a result of the pandemic. Such help is offered on a completely confidential basis.

The Henry Smith Fund – Shere is rather older having existed since 1628. It is completely independent, but gains its income from the national Henry Smith Charity which is one of the largest, grant making charities in the country, last year having distributed approximately £30,000,000 in charitable grants. Before he died in 1627 Henry Smith left instructions to his appointed trustees that they were to set up charities in 200 named parishes, one of which was Shere. Although over the years certain changes have taken place, the charity continues to operate to help those in need in the Parish.

It makes some monthly payments to elderly residents on limited incomes. It helps younger people to buy badly needed items which they cannot afford, for example household goods such as a washing machine, baby equipment or other expenses. It also makes grants to local organisations. The common feature of both of the above schemes is that they are underutilised. Applications to the Village Larder have been far fewer than anticipated and the Henry Smith Fund is receiving far below the number of requests they could handle. I wish again to make a plea to all readers to think carefully of anyone they know whom they suspect is in need of help and advise them to contact either myself or the Clerk to the Henry Smith Fund, or to tell us so that we may contact them. We have the funds and are anxious to be of help to anyone in the Parish who needs it.
